## A PLEA FOR DONATIONS

We are so very fortunate to have such wonderful friends in Lavaca County. We do need to keep in mind that the fence is old and badly rusting in some areas. It will have to be replaced in the nottoo-distant future.

Also, Tom Finger, our Vice-President, Lavaca County went to check on the state of the cemetery and found that a hackberry tree is dying and needs to be taken down before it falls and damages monuments. That will be taken care of by Mr. Earl Schacherl in the next few weeks, but it is also an unexpected expense. To sum things up - there are <u>many</u> expenses involved in maintaining and improving Bennett Cemetery. All of us who have ancestors there or who just have an interest in preserving history need to donate whatever we can to make its preservation certain.

## **OUR MYSTERIES**

So far we have not received answers to our first two mysteries - the marker with a July 10, 1890 death date and the yellow PVC pipes. We hope that some day we will find the answers. If this date rings a bell or you know anything about the pipes, please let us know.



THE NEW MYSTERY SOLVED

In the last newsletter we reported the finding of the marker shown above. Almost immediately we found the answer. One of our board members, Jimmie Ruth Eash, wrote to say that her family records showed that Leanna Permelia Bennett was born on January 30, 1835, married Nathaniel H. Cox, had two daughters, and died August 5, 1870.

### One of their granddaughters, Rebecca Cox

Youngkin, who was born in 1895, attended the dedication of the historical marker. She told Gene Bethel at that time that when she found Leanna's marker missing and Nathaniel's on the ground, she had Nathaniel's moved to a cemetery in Yoakum.

This piece was found, face down, in front of a concrete base and the same type of concrete base next to it is no doubt where Nathaniel H. Cox is buried. It would be wonderful if a family member would have Nathaniel Cox's marker moved back to Bennett Cemetery. Meanwhile, we will put the location on the cemetery map as soon as we determine its exact placement.

#### A NEW NAME DISCOVERED

Brenda Lincke-Fisseler, who has been such a help to us over the years, sent information which, without doubt, adds a new name to the list of those interred in Bennett Cemetery. It is that of Emily Rosa or Rosa Emily Neely who was the wife of James Franklin Neely and the daughter-in-law of George A. and Ellen J. Neely, both of whom rest there. While the cemetery was being surveyed and mapped, dowsing rods indicated two unmarked graves within the chain-link fence of the Neely plot. Now, thanks to Brenda, we have the name of one of them.

## MARKER RENOVATION PROJECT

As you may remember, the association applied to the Lavaca County Historical Commission for a grant to be used for the renovation and repair of monuments in the cemetery. We are very grateful to the commission for its grant of \$500.00 to be used for this purpose.

The board adjourned to the cemetery to determine which of the monuments would be included in this year's selection. This time we were looking for both monuments which were in peril of falling over and some that were easily straightened and put back together. The ones selected were a very large family marker in the Bennett plot, and four with the names McCord, Jno., Bonnie G. Dyer, Johnie Erie Dyer, and John P. Dyer.

The grant from the Historical Commission will only cover about half of the cost for this renovation work. In addition, the Commission notified us that in the future they will only be funding Texas State Historical markers. We are very grateful for all of their past support, but now we ask that, if at all possible, the descendants of these people make a donation and note that it is being sent for that purpose.
